# SUMMARY ANALYSIS OF SOUTH AFRICA'S TOURIST ARRIVALS FOR DECEMBER 2021

**NOTE:** To limit the spread of COVID-19 and prepare the health care sector, the South African government announced a 21-day national lockdown from 27 April 2020, which prevented the movement of people entering and leaving South Africa. The South African government adopted the risk adjustment strategy that aimed to increase economic activity while putting measures in place to reduce the transmission of the virus. As part of this approach, five (5) Coronavirus alert levels were introduced, which indicated the different sectors that can operate under these levels. Under levels 2-5, the risk adjustment strategy prevented international tourists from entering the borders of South Africa, between April-September 2020. However, exceptions were made for other South Africans and travellers from other countries to return to their country of residence. Furthermore, permission was also given to export specific cargo and permitted retail goods to neighbouring countries, which included all goods imported via South African ports of entry.

During December 2021, South Africa was under adjusted alert level 1, which allowed for international tourists to travel to the country subject to restrictions. These restrictions stipulated that all travellers visiting the country will be expected to abide by the regulations that include mandatory wearing of masks at all times, practising social distancing in public spaces, regular washing or sanitizing of hands and presenting a negative COVID-19 test result not older than 72 hours from the time of departure (<a href="https://www.gov.za/covid-19/about/coronavirus-covid-19-alert-level-1">https://www.gov.za/covid-19/about/coronavirus-covid-19-alert-level-1</a>). Statistics South Africa (Stats SA) has therefore published data on the number of tourist arrivals during December 2021, and this report provides a further analysis of the tourists that travelled to South Africa during December 2021. The performance of tourist arrivals for the January-December 2021 period compared to January-December 2020 period are also provided in the report.

### TREND ANALYSIS: DECEMBER 2016 – DECEMBER 2021

A total of 263 108 tourist arrivals was recorded in December 2021, which was an increase of 32.8% (65 049) compared to the same month in 2020.

Figure 1 below indicates tourist arrivals for the period December 2016 to December 2021. Tourist arrivals increased by 2.7% (26 472), from 965 107 in 2016 to 991 579 in 2017. Tourist arrivals further increased by 1.6% (15 576) in 2018, from 991 579 in 2017 to 1 007 155 in 2018. Then in December 2019, tourist arrivals decreased by -2.6% (-26,117) when compared to the same month in 2018. A further negative growth of -79.8% was seen in tourist arrivals in 2020, when tourist arrivals moved from 981 038 in December 2019 to 198 059 in December 2020.

Table 1 below indicates tourist arrivals by region for December 2021 compared to the same month in 2020. All regions experienced an increase in tourist arrivals during December 2021 when compared to the same month in 2020, except for Middle East, which shown a decrease of -45,5% (-340). North America recorded the highest increase of 139,3% (6 498) followed by Central and South America (59,9%; 354), Australasia (38,8%; 233), Europe (29,6%; 7 951) and Asia with 16,1% (463) increase. Africa region also recorded an increase of 30,9% (49 851) and this region remained the main source of tourist arrivals to the country, accounting for 80,3% (211 209) of total tourist arrivals during December 2021.

## TOURIST ARRIVALS BY REGION: JANUARY-DECEMBER 2021 COMPARED TO JANUARY-DECEMBER 2020

Tourist arrivals figures by region for the January-December 2021 period compared to the same period in 2020 are indicated in table 2 below. Total tourist arrivals went down by -19,5% during January-December 2021 compared to January-December 2020. This was a decline from a total of 2 802 320 tourist arrivals seen during January-December 2020 to 2 255 699 (-546 621) total arrivals during January-December in 2021. Total tourist arrivals from the overseas market decreased by -42,8% (-283 226). Australasia (-80,0%) recorded the highest negative growth followed by Central and South America (-67,4%), Europe (-51,4%), and Asia (-24,0%). Middle East recorded a growth of 1,4% and North America had a slight increase of 0,01% during the period under review.

In Australasia, Australia had the highest decline in volume of -16 661 (-80,4%) followed by New Zealand (-3 033; -78,0%). In Central and South America, Brazil recorded the highest decline in volume (-14 022: -72,3%), and the United Kingdom had the highest decline in volume (-86 607; -65,4%) in the Europe region. Total tourist arrivals from Africa region decreased by -12,3% (-263 915), and this decline in volume was driven by Zimbabwe (-273 816; -40,0%), followed by Lesotho (-93 490; -20,8%) and Eswatini (-37 297; -17,4%), refer to table 3 below.

Table 3 below gives the rankings of the top ten African source markets for the period January-December 2021 compared to January-December 2020. Most of the top ten African source markets moved their positions except for Eswatini, Botswana and Namibia which ranked in 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> positions respectively during both periods. Mozambique, Zambia, Tanzania and

DRC all moved up their positions in 2021. Mozambique was 3<sup>rd</sup> position during January-December 2020 and moved to 1<sup>st</sup> position during the same period in 2021; Zambia moved from 8<sup>th</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup> position and Tanzania improved its 10<sup>th</sup> position by moving to 9<sup>th</sup> position. During January-December 2020 period, the DRC entered the top ten list and removed Angola from the top ten African country rankings; moving up from the 12<sup>th</sup> position to 10<sup>th</sup> position during January-December 2021 period. Zimbabwe dropped from its 1<sup>st</sup> position to 2<sup>nd</sup> position and Lesotho moved from 2<sup>nd</sup> position to 3<sup>rd</sup> position. More than half of the top ten countries recorded a positive growth in international arrivals, with Namibia recording the highest positive growth of 67.8%, followed by Zambia (47,7%), DRC (42,6%), Mozambique (23,7%), Tanzania (20,7%) and Malawi (5,5%).

Table 4 shows the rankings of the top ten overseas source markets. Comparing January-December 2021 with January-December 2020, most of the top 10 overseas markets recorded a decrease in tourist arrivals except for Russia Federation and the USA, which increased by 63,3% and 14,0% respectively. All overseas source markets moved their positions during the period under review, with USA replacing UK as the main overseas source market. In the January-December 2021 top ten overseas source market list, Brazil and Australia were replaced by Russian Federation and Belgium.
